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Is architecture under bailout?

The architectural works in this edition of *Habitar Portugal* were selected with one question in mind: has architecture been bailed out? The outcome is not to be seen as a conclusive answer, but rather an open reflection. Each of the eighty works presented herein contributes to building a perception of a significant moment in time for Portuguese architecture. The proposed theme should be seen as a contextualisation, and the criteria for selection, communicated in advance, as a support for that contextualisation. The three-year period covered by this edition, 2012–2014, coincides with the financial bailout programme for the Portuguese economy. Accordingly, we have set out to analyse and understand the inevitable impact that this development has had on Portuguese architects and architecture. Our observation of the works fails to reveal any specific concern with the programmes or actions that, in one way or another, may have integrated the current social, political and economic situation as a theme. Instead, we seek to understand, in the field of practice, what the impact of the current situation – of which we do not know how transitional it will be – is, how it reveals itself and what consequences it will have.

Architecture is a social practice and, for that reason, depends on and is conditioned by, the resources through which society reflects in form, object and space the period it is experiencing. At the same time architecture has an author (or several), meaning that each architect is a filter that reorganizes diverse ideas from different sources and execute them in a design or work. Architecture is therefore also an authorial practice, no matter how much it is part of the phenomena that have affected the social space in which it operates. The works presented herein are a testament to this idea; the variety of choices, practices and positions is evident even when we want to look at them from a specific vantage point.

This is the fifth edition of *Habitar Portugal*, which has now covered the fifteen years of Portuguese architectural output since the year 2000. It provides an opportune moment to cross-analyse its successive editions and, taking into account the perception of the time we now live in, reflect on the accumulated works which, superimposed, constitute an image of an extended period of time in the life of Portuguese architecture. This process, that we have referred to as palimpsest, has led to the acknowledgement of an ongoing process of profound change. The alterations to the teaching of architecture and the multiplication of new public and private degree courses – and resulting dissemination of differing training processes – are a new factor to be considered in this time frame. The public recognition Portuguese architecture has gained, above all thanks to its more mediatic designers, and the growing importance of

the participation of architects in the construction market, with the resulting ongoing debate on disciplinary independence and the social and legal status of the profession, are themes that are ever-present, albeit subject to constant re-contextualisation. The growing internationalisation of its creators and creations has led to greater social visibility for Portuguese architecture which has outgrown the profession's traditional channels for its own dissemination and discussion.

At the same time, there is an ongoing discussion of the conditions and opportunities of the profession, which, even as these are disseminated throughout the country, cannot but reproduce the asymmetries that are to be found in all other activities, whether one sees them as an opportunity or a constraint.

Habitar Portugal is an important commitment that the Portuguese Association of Architects (OA) has taken on for the dissemination of architecture and the debate of its role and related public policies. For this reason it is important to see architecture as a phenomenon that is extended in time, not lastly because that extended presence is part of its very nature. But today it is equally vital to allow ourselves these expanded spaces of reflection, at a time when the rapid consumption of images and the emergence of new processes of dissemination and legitimisation of architecture brings us increasingly face to face with new facts that must be considered and critically analysed. This exhibition, produced together with EGEAC with the institutional support from Lisbon City Hall, will be touring the country until the end of 2017, seeking, in the diverse forms it may take, to examine, debate and report on the state and condition of Portuguese architecture in the present day, also taking into account the previous editions of *Habitar Portugal*. Each leg of the tour is unique, both in terms of the exhibition layout and the curators' work and thought processes in the form of further original content. At the Palácio Pombal the focus is very much on works in the Lisbon Metropolitan Area (LMA), giving the viewer a more complete perception of those works, through both the videos "Specific Atmosphere" and the public presentations by their authors in the parallel events program, where the programmed debates seek to bring to the discussion views of different natures and thereby broaden their scope.

The bailout process for the Portuguese economy presupposes an adjustment as a consequence of this state of suspension and reassessment. Moments of crisis have in the past proved to be fertile for architecture and its history; so how should we see and understand the one we are now going through? If architecture too has been bailed out, how is it adjusting?

CLOUD exhibition system

The CLOUD exhibition system resulted from a public competition launched by the Association of Architects (won by Nelson João, Ivo Gouveia Carvalho e Rodrigo Seixas), consists of a ‘scaffolding’ system which adapts to the spaces of the travelling exhibition.

The 80 exhibited works are organized according to the six regions HP 12–14 is divided into, and displayed through a solution developed by the designers João Araújo, Rita Huet (and atelier), the curators and the assembly team at Porto Municipal Gallery. Each exhibition side features two to four buildings, in the form of panels with images, drawings, technical information, and descriptive texts on the works, as well as a digital frame displaying additional information in a loop.

For each region, for the first time, all the selected works since the first edition, are shown on a single map, allowing a comprehensive reading of their geographic distribution, and the comparison between periods. This endeavour to create a diffuse archive that potentially facilitates cross-readings is one of the tools we have made available for reflection on the architectural output in the 2012–14 period.

Wall HP 12–14

The Wall HP 12–14 is a concept specifically developed with each individual stop on this travelling exhibition. The curators can thus shine a spotlight on the selected works from each region and establish relationships with works from previous editions. The ‘wall’ includes records of visits to the buildings and excerpts from publications and texts, etc., and was ‘built’ as the exhibition itself was being assembled.

Specific Atmosphere

Debate **Bailout and palimpsest: how architecture views itself from a reconfiguration**

Debate **Visibility and crime: temporary architecture, events and media presence**

Portuguese architecture has in recent years gained considerable visibility; however, the conditions in which it is practised have now changed. The decrease in public commissions and the recent economic crisis have drastically restricted opportunities for architects, giving rise to a reduction in work that crosses all generations. One of the most visible consequences of this has been the growth of previously less frequented programmes and fields of activity. Temporary architecture has conquered a space that was hitherto less conspicuous, a space that *Habitar Portugal* has sought to reflect in this edition by including a number of examples in the final selection of built works. Furthermore, the ways in which architecture gains visibility have changed. Websites, blogs and the social networks now complement, or even replace, the traditional, institutional channels for the dissemination and discussion of architecture. Likewise, events at which architecture is the theme or focal point have multiplied and architecture's media impact has also increased. These changes have manifested themselves in the contexts and discourses in and through which architecture is presented. How do we architects see this process and how should we react to its consequences? Will increasing media presence contribute to the democratisation of architecture? How will architecture, as an ancient discipline and field, survive these changes?

Debate **Bail-out and palimpsest: how does architecture see itself after a reconfiguration?**

Historically, times of great upheaval have been accompanied by major stylistic ruptures in architecture. The 20s and 30s and Modernism; the post-war period and the critical revision of Modernism in the 50s and 60; the political

and social upheavals in the late 60s and Post-Modernism and economic political changes in the US and UK; the recent technological revolution and new formal possibilities accompanied by the ever increasing presence of an ecological awareness that defines our daily work.

The financial bail-out that Portugal required coincided with the period that this edition of *Habitar Portugal* registers and seeks to understand. Additionally, over the period of the travelling exhibition, new facts have emerged that must also be included in our debate. Something we all seem to sense at the moment is ongoing profound change, an idea of a present that seems to be increasingly elusive. The bail-out resulted in a process of adjustment. But since then further political complexity has been added: Europe-wide political upheaval resulting from the refugee crisis, sovereign debt and Brexit is leading to debate of the very European model we live in – and then comes the result of the elections in the US. Is this an historic moment? A transformative moment? Is this a moment of rupture? Architecture is always a materialisation of the ideas of its time, its material expression. How and where does architecture figure in this context?

Presentations **Lisbon Metropolitan Area (LMA) Works**

In each of its regional exhibitions *Habitar Portugal* 2012-2014 has sought to showcase works from the respective region. Hence the focus on selected works from the Lisbon Metropolitan Area (LMA) in this show. The parallel programme includes three sessions in which the architects present their works, followed by a debate moderated by the curators. The HP theme, "has architecture been bailed out?", will provide the context for the debates, allowing for cross insight into the views of the designers taking part.
